Word Origin:

[**aggrieved**] Middle English (in the sense 'distressed'): past participle of aggrieve, from Old French *agrever* 'make heavier', based on Latin *aggravare*, from *ad-* (expressing increase) + *gravis* 'heavy'.

Example Bank:

- The villagers felt deeply aggrieved by the closing of the railway station.
- 'What am I supposed to do about it?' he said in an aggrieved tone.
