Word Origin:

Middle English: from Old French *as(s)enter* (verb), *as(s)ente* (noun), based on Latin *assentire*, from *ad-* 'towards' + *sentire* 'feel, think'.

- Medicine is, by common assent, a good profession.
- She smiled in assent.
- The Education Act received the royal assent in 1944.
- The government gave their assent to the project.
- The raising of taxes without the assent of Parliament was declared illegal.
- The suggestion was greeted with a murmur of assent.
- There was general assent about his achievements.
- She gave her assent to publication.
- The finance bill has yet to receive congressional assent.
- The moment a bill receives the Royal Assent it becomes an Act of Parliament.
- The patient nodded his assent.
- They took her silence for assent.
