[dis'lɒdʒ] *v*

- 1) 1) заставить (кого-л.) уйти  
to dislodge smb. from a hiding-place - заставить кого-л. покинуть убежище  
to dislodge an animal from its lair - поднять зверя
- 2) вытеснять, смещать  
to dislodge a chairman - сместить председателя, заставить председателя покинуть свой пост
- 3) сдвигать, смещать  
to dislodge a lid - сдвинуть крышку
- 4) приводить в движение, к падению  
in climbing the cliff he dislodged a stone - взбираясь на утёс, он столкнул камень
- 5) перемещаться; сниматься с места
2. **воен.** выбивать (с позиций)  
to dislodge the enemy from a hill - выбить противника с высоты
3. **спорт.** сбивать  
to dislodge the bar - сбить планку
4. **физ.** выбивать (частицу)

Word Origin:

late Middle English: from Old French *deslogier*, from *des-* (expressing reversal) + *logier* 'encamp', from *loge* 'arbour, hut' from medieval Latin *laubia, lobia, lobium* 'covered walk, portico'.

- She thumped him on the back, trying to dislodge the obstruction in his windpipe.
- The key was rusted and stuck firmly, seemingly impossible to dislodge.
- The wind had dislodged one or two tiles from the roof.
