**Eu·cha·rist***n.* the Christian ceremony commemorating the Last Supper, in which bread and wine are consecrated and consumed

- the consecrated elements, esp. the bread
- The bread and wine are referred to as the body and blood of Christ, though much theological controversy has focused on how substantially or symbolically this is to be interpreted. The service of worship is also called **Holy Communion** or (chiefly in the Protestant tradition) **the Lord's Supper** or (chiefly in the Catholic tradition) **the Mass** or (chiefly in the Eastern Orthodox tradition) **the Divine Liturgy**.
