- a word, sentence, etc. that is added to a speech or piece of writing, especially in order to give extra information. In writing, it is separated from the rest of the text using brackets, commas or dashes.
- (*formal* or *NAmE*) (*BrE* **bracket**, '**round bracket**') **usually plural** either of a pair of marks, ( ) placed around extra information in a piece of writing or part of a problem in mathematics
  - Irregular forms are given **in parentheses** .

Word Origin:mid 16th cent.: via late Latin from Greek, from **parentithenai** 'put in beside'.Example Bank:

- I add, in parenthesis, that I doubt whether such a place exists.
- The numbers outside the parentheses are the sales figures.
- The prices are given in parentheses.
- The words in parentheses should be deleted.
- I should say, in parenthesis, that these figures cannot always be trusted.
