Word Origin:

late 19th cent.: from French *intransigeant*, from Spanish *los intransigentes* (a name adopted by the extreme republicans in the Cortes (Spanish parliament), 1873–4); based on Latin *in-* ‘not’ + *transigere* ‘come to an understanding’.
