Word Origin:early 17th cent.: from French, from Provençal *acolada*, literally ‘**embrace around the neck (when bestowing knighthood)**’, from Latin *ad-* ‘at, to’ + *collum* ‘neck’.Example Bank:

- Four restaurants have been awarded the highest accolade of a three-star rating.
- a long list of industry accolades
- He was finally awarded the ultimate accolade — British Hairdresser of the Year— in 2007.
