Word Origin:[**invidious**] early 17th cent.: from Latin *invidiosus*, from *invidia*, from *invidere* ‘regard maliciously, grudge’, from *in-* ‘into’ + *videre* ‘to see’.Example Bank:

- Union leaders called the new rules ‘invidious and divisive’.
- We were in the invidious position of having to choose whether to break the law or risk our lives.
