mid 16th cent.: of unknown origin.

Example Bank:

- The audience jeered loudly when he came on stage.
- The crowd jeered at the police.
- Disappointed fans jeered at the players.
- The police were jeered by the waiting crowd.

noun usually plural

a rude remark that sb shouts at sb else to show that they do not respect or like them

Syn: †taunt

- He walked on to the stage to be greeted with jeers and whistles.
