Word Origin:late Middle English: from medieval Latin *infirmaria*, from Latin *infirmus*, from *in-* ‘not’ + *firmus* ‘firm’.Example Bank:

- He had his leg bandaged in the infirmary.
- She works at the Radcliffe Infirmary.
- When she collapsed at dinner they took her to the local infirmary.
- He had to remain in the college infirmary for about a fortnight
- Surgeons at the Radcliffe Infirmary successfully removed a blood clot from her brain.
