to rout smb. out of his bed - стащить кого-л. с постели
we were routed out before daylight for passport examination - нас подняли ночью для проверки паспортов
 3. **выселять, выгонять**
to rout smb. out of home - выгнать кого-л. из дому

- Only the skill of the goalkeeper prevented the match from turning into a rout.

Word Origin:

Middle English: ultimately based on Latin **ruptus** 'broken', from the verb **rumpere**; the current senses (late 16th cent.) are from obsolete French **route**, probably from Italian **rotta** 'break-up of an army'; the other senses are via Anglo-Norman French **rute**.

Example Bank:

- The offensive into rebel-held territory had ended in a rout.
