Word Origin:

late Middle English: perhaps an Anglo-Norman French form of Old French **cassette**, diminutive of **casse**, **chasse**, from Latin **capsa**, related to **capere** 'to hold'.

- the flag-draped caskets of soldiers coming home
- Inside lay a casket of gold coins.
