 to appoint a committee - создать комиссию
2. договариваться, условливаться (*о месте или времени*); назначать
 to appoint a day for the wedding [for the meeting, for the trial] - назначить день свадьбы [собрания, суда]

 - ~ **sb to do sth** A lawyer was appointed to represent the child.
2. *usually passive* ~ **sth (formal)** to arrange or decide on a time or place for doing sth
 - A date for the meeting is still to be appointed.
 - Everyone was assembled at the **appointed time**.

The committee appointed a day in June for celebrations.

Everyone assembled in the hall at the appointed time (=at the time that had been arranged).
