it does not amount to a row of beans - *амер.* это ломаного гроша /выеденного яйца/ не стоит

they rowed forty (strokes) to the minute - они делали сорок взмахов /гребков/ в минуту

2. принимать участие в гребных гонках (*тж.* to row a race)

to row against smb. - соревноваться (*с кем-л.*) в гоночной гребле

Cambridge rowed against Oxford - команда Кембриджского университета выступила в гребных гонках против команды Оксфорда

to row for smb. - участвовать в гоночной гребле (*на чьей-л. стороне*)

I row for Cambridge - я член команды по гоночной гребле Кембриджского университета

he rows No. 5 in the Oxford crew - он выступает под номером 5 в команде по гоночной гребле Оксфордского университета

3. перевозить в лодке

to row smb. across a river - перевезти /переправить/ кого-л. на лодке через реку

4. иметь определённое количество вёсел (*о лодке*)

the barge rows twenty oars - на баркасе имеется двадцать гребцов

5. плавать, плескаться в воде (*о рыбе, водоплавающей птице*)

◇ to row against the wind /against the stream, against the flood, against the tide/ - приниматься за трудную работу, действовать в неблагоприятных условиях; ≅ плыть против течения [*ср. тж.* 1]

to row in the same /in one/ boat - действовать совместно (*с кем-л.*), быть одних убеждений (*с кем-л.*)

to row smb. up - *амер. сл.* подвергнуть кого-л. суровой критике

to row smb. up Salt River - *амер. сл.* «прокатить» кого-л. на выборах, нанести кому-л. поражение

noun

1. ~ (of sb/sth) a number of people standing or sitting next to each other in a line; a number of objects arranged in a line

- a row of trees
- We sat **in a row** at the back of the room.
- The vegetables were planted in neat rows.

2. a line of seats in a cinema/movie theater, etc

- Let's sit in the back row.
- Our seats are five rows from the front.

3. a complete line of **stitches** in knitting or ↑crochet

4. **Row** used in the name of some roads

- Manor Row

5. **usually singular** an act of ↑rowing a boat; the period of time spent doing this

- We went for a row on the lake.

Row or line? People or things in a **row** are next to each other from side to side. People or things in a **line** can be next to each other from side to side, but are more often one behind the other from front to back. People or vehicles in a **row** are not usually waiting for anything; those in a **line** usually are

- a row of parked cars
- a line of traffic waiting at the lights

In British English the usual word for people waiting in a line is **queue**; in American English it is **line**.

Example Bank:

- He looked down at row upon row of eager faces.
- It rained for five days in a row.
- She arranged the chairs in two neat rows.
- The children stood in a row.
- We have seats in the front row.
- a long row of houses
- endless rows of identical houses
- serried rows of vines
- He turned into Church Row.
- I live at 22 Western Row.
- Let's sit in the back row.
- They live in a row house in Washington's Mount Pleasant neighborhood
- a row of children/houses/trees

Idiom: ↑in a row

verb

1. **intransitive, transitive** to move a boat through water using ↑oars (= long wooden poles with flat ends)

- We rowed around the island.
- ~ **sth** Grace rowed the boat out to sea again.

2. **transitive** ~ **sb (+ adv./prep.)** to take sb somewhere in a boat with ↑oars

- The fisherman rowed us back to the shore.

noun (informal, especially BrE)

1. **countable** ~ (about/over sth) a serious disagreement between people, organizations, etc. about sth
 - A row has broken out over education.
2. **countable** a noisy argument between two or more people

Syn: †quarrel

 - She left him after a **blazing row** .
 - family rows
 - He **had a row with** his son.
3. **singular** a loud unpleasant noise

Syn: †din, **Syn:** †racket

 - Who's making that row?

Example Bank:

- A row blew up over pay rises for ministers.
- Carol and I had a terrible row about how much money she spends.
- He came to prominence in the row over defence policy.
- I'm going to kick up a row if I don't get my money back.
- Someone's making an unholy row outside.
- We had a blazing row over who should do the cooking.
- a row between the left and right wings of the party
- a row with my mother
- A row has broken out over education.
- He'd had a row with his son.
- She left him after a blazing row.

verb intransitive (BrE, informal)

to have a noisy argument

- Mike and Sue are always rowing.
- ~ (with sb) (about sb/sth) She had rowed with her parents about her boyfriend.

row of seats

1. a line of things or people next to each other ⇒ **column**

row of

- a row of houses
- rows of trees

in a row

- The children were asked to stand in a row.
- row upon row (=many rows) of shelves stacked with books

2. a line of seats in a theatre or cinema:

- We sat in the front row.

3. **in a row** happening a number of times, one after the other **SYN consecutively**

4 nights/3 weeks etc in a row

- She's been out four nights in a row.
- I've beaten her three times in a row.

4. used in the name of some roads:

- 22 Church Row

5. **a hard/tough row to hoe** used to say that a particular situation is difficult

II. **row**² /raʊ/ BrE^u AmE^u *noun* British English

1. [countable] a short angry argument, especially between people who know each other well **SYN quarrel**

row with

- He had just had a row with his wife.

row about

- What was the row about?
- a family row
- a blazing row (=a very angry argument)

2. [countable] a situation in which people disagree strongly about important public matters **SYN controversy**

row about/over

- a new row over government secrecy

3. [singular] a loud unpleasant noise that continues for a long time **SYN racket**:

- Stop that row – I'm trying to get to sleep!
- . . .

- **have a row** Have you and Peter had a row?

■ **ADJECTIVES/NOUN + row**

- **a huge row** They had a huge row when he got back home early yesterday.
- **a furious row** She left the party after a furious row with her boyfriend.
- **a blazing/flaming row** (=a very angry row) She had a blazing row with Eddie and stormed out of the house.
- **a stand-up row** (=a very angry row) That night there was a stand-up row among the four kidnappers.
- **a family row** When he turned up late, there was a family row.
- **an unholy row** *informal* (=a very angry row) An unholy row broke out between two of the men drinking in the bar.

- She rowed across the lake.
- Jenny used to row at college (=as a sport).

—**row** *noun* [singular]:

- Why don't we go for a row?

—**rower** *noun* [countable]

- They rowed about money all the time.

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
