- The singer was accompanied on the piano by her sister.

Word Origin:

late Middle English: from Old French **accompagner**, from **a-** (from Latin **ad** 'to, at') + **compagne**, from Old French **compaignon** 'companion'. The spelling change was due to association with **company**.

### 1. to go somewhere with someone:

- Children under 14 must be accompanied by an adult.
- Wherever her husband went, she would accompany him.

### REGISTER

In everyday English, people usually say **go with** or **come with** someone rather than **accompany** someone:

- Do you want me to **go with** you to the station?
- She **came with** me to church.

### 2. to play a musical instrument while someone sings a song or plays the main tune:

- Daniel wanted Liz to accompany him on violin.

### 3. [usually passive] to happen or exist at the same time as something else:

- The disease is accompanied by sneezing and fever.

4. if a book, document etc accompanies something, it comes with it:

" Please see accompanying booklet for instructions.

" Your passport application form should be accompanied by two recent photographs.
