Word Origin:

late Middle English: from Latin **implicatus** 'folded in', past participle of **implicare**, from **in-** 'in' + **plicare** 'to fold'. The original sense was 'entwine'; compare with **employ** and **imply**. The earliest modern sense ('to convey something indirectly'), dates from the early 17th cent.
