## 1) человек, парень, малый

a fellow - кто-то, любой человек (в т. ч. говорящий)

a fellow can't work all day long - не может же человек работать весь день

why can't you let a fellow alone! - оставьте меня в покое!

good fellow - славный малый

jolly fellow - весёлый малый, весельчак; компанейский парень

little fellow - малыш, ребёнок

poor fellow - бедняга

old fellow - старик, старина, дружище

my dear fellow - мой дорогой

my good fellow - любезный, дорогой мой (*обыкн. с оттенком протеста или неодобрения*)2) *презр.* тип

that captain fellow who is always with her - этот капитанишка, который крутится около неё

tell that fellow to go away - (про)гони этого типа

there is a fellow downstairs who would like to speak to you - какая-то личность внизу хочет поговорить с вами

## 2. товарищ, собрат

fellows at school - товарищи по школе

a fellow in misery - товарищ по несчастью

fellows in arms - соратники, товарищи по оружию

a fellow in crime - *арх.* соучастник преступления

Word Origin:

late Old English *fēolaga* 'a partner or colleague' (literally 'one who lays down money in a joint enterprise'), from Old Norse *félagi*, from *fé* 'cattle, property, money' + the Germanic base of *†lay* (verband noun).

Example Bank:

- She was elected a fellow of the Academy.
- The poor fellow had his wallet stolen.
- He became a teaching fellow at the University of Texas.
- He's a fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons.
- She's a fellow of New College, Oxford.

**adjective only before noun** used to describe sb who is the same as you in some way, or in the same situation

- **fellow members/citizens/workers**
- my **fellow passengers** on the train
- I recognized a fellow sufferer, waiting nervously outside the exam room.
