Word Origin:

late Middle English: from Old French **tissu** 'woven', past participle of **tistre**, from Latin **texere** 'to weave'. The word originally denoted a rich material, often interwoven with gold or silver threads, later (mid 16th cent.) any woven fabric, hence the sense of 'intricacy'.

Example Bank:

- Dyes were extracted by boiling the plant tissue.
- He wiped his nose on a tissue.
- She gently dabbed her eyes with a tissue.
- She grabbed a wad of tissues from the box and soaked up the spilt wine.
- She treats skin and soft tissue injuries in casualty.
- Vitamin C helps maintain healthy connective tissue.
