Word Origin:

Middle English: from Old French *jolif*, an earlier form of *joli* 'pretty', perhaps from Old Norse *jól*, originally applied to a heathen festival lasting twelve days, later to Christmas.

jolly somebody along phrasal verb

to try to make someone do something faster by encouraging them:

He jollied people along and got useful information out of them.

jolly somebody into something phrasal verb informal

to gently persuade someone to do something:

She jollied the children into going for a walk.
