poor attendance - плохая посещаемость
 attendance teacher - **амер.** школьный работник, ответственный за посещаемость и за возвращение прогульщиков в школу
 to take attendance - делать переключку
 the teacher takes attendance before class - до занятий учитель проводит переключку
 attendance at school is compulsory - посещение школы обязательно

2) **пед. проф.** день занятий в школе

how many attendances has he made? - сколько дней он был в школе?
 he missed three attendances this year - в этом году он прогулял три дня

3. аудитория, публика

large [small] attendance - большая [небольшая] аудитория
 there was a large attendance at the meeting - на собрании было много народу

4. свита

to be in attendance - сопровождать (*короля и т. п.*)
 Major X was in attendance upon the Queen - королеву сопровождал майор X

5. уход, обслуживание

medical attendance - медицинское обслуживание, врачебный уход
 now that the patient is out of danger the doctor is no longer in attendance - теперь, когда пациент вне опасности, врач уже не находится при нём всё время

6. уход (за *машиной*); техобслуживание

◇ to dance attendance on /upon/ smb. - прислуживаться, ходить на задних лапках перед кем-л.

late Middle English: from Old French, from **atendre** 'give one's attention to', from Latin **attendere**, from **ad-** 'to' + **tendere** 'stretch'.
