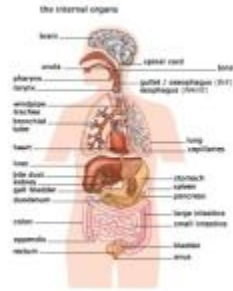

ap·pen·dix **AW** [appendix appendices appendixes] **BrE** [ə'pendɪks] **NAmE** [ə'pendɪks] **noun** (*pl.* **ap·pen·di·ces** **BrE** [ə'pendɪsɪz] ; **NAmE** [ə'pendɪsɪz] or **ap·pen·dixes** **BrE** [ə'pendɪksɪz] ; **NAmE** [ə'pendɪksɪz])

- a small bag of **tissue** that is attached to the large **intestine**. In humans, the **appendix** has no clear function
 - He had to have his appendix out (= removed).



- a section giving extra information at the end of a book or document
 - Full details are given in Appendix 3.

Word Origin:

mid 16th cent. (in sense 2): from Latin, from **appendere** 'hang upon', from **ad-** 'to' + **pendere** 'hang'. Sense 1 dates from the early 17th cent.

Example Bank:

- He was taken to hospital with a burst appendix.
- If the condition is not treated, the appendix can rupture.
- She might have to have her appendix out.
