 - Nationalist parties united to oppose the government's plans.
2. **transitive, intransitive** to make people or things join together to form a unit; to join together
 - ~ **(sb/sth)** A special bond unites our two countries.
 - His aim was to unite Italy.
 - The two countries united in 1887.
 - ~ **(sb/sth) (with sb/sth)** She unites keen business skills with a charming personality.

late Middle English: from Latin **unit-** 'joined together', from the verb **unire**, from **unus** 'one'.
