3. **intransitive, transitive** if people, plants, animals, etc. reproduce or reproduce themselves, they produce young
  - Most reptiles reproduce by laying eggs on land.
  - ~ **itself** cells reproducing themselves (= making new ones)

- **reproduce** to print a copy of a picture or document, especially in a book or newspaper: The image has been reproduced in many magazines and newspapers around the world.
