 to endorse a bill in blank - сделать на векселе бланковую передаточную надпись

3. отмечать на обороте (*документа*); вписывать (*в документ*)

3. ~ sth to write your name on the back of a cheque so that it can be paid into a bank account

 - You risk having your licence endorsed.

Word Origin:

late 15th cent. (in the sense 'write on the back of'; formerly also as indorse): from medieval Latin *indorsare*, from Latin *in-* 'in, on' + *dorsum* 'back'.

Example Bank:

- The government has broadly endorsed the research paper.
- The newspaper has formally endorsed the Democratic candidate.
- The plan does not explicitly endorse the private ownership of land.
