- Each song bears the signature of its performer.
- The form requires the signatures of two witnesses.
- The law recognizes a digital signature for online transactions.
- The salesperson verifies the signature by comparing it with the one on the card.
- The will bears her signature.
- They collected over 1 000 signatures for the petition.
