Word Origin:late Middle English: via Old French from medieval Latin *correspondentia*, from *correspondent-* 'corresponding' from the verb *correspondere*, from *cor-* 'together' + Latin *respondere*, from *re-* 'again' + *spondere* 'to pledge'.Example Bank:
