Word Origin:

late Middle English (also in the sense 'break down into component parts'): from Latin *dissolvere*, from *dis-* 'apart' + *solvere* 'loosen or solve'.

Example Bank:

- The aspirin hasn't dissolved completely yet.
- The civilian government was effectively dissolved.
- The limestone has simply dissolved away.
- Their marriage was formally dissolved last year.
- His calm response dissolved her confusion.
- The lights in the windows faded and the house dissolved into darkness again.

1. BECOME PART OF LIQUID

[*intransitive and transitive*] if a solid dissolves, or if you dissolve it, it mixes with a liquid and becomes part of it:

" Stir until the sugar dissolves.

" Sugar dissolves in water.

dissolve something in something

" Dissolve the tablet in water.

2. END [transitive] to formally end a parliament, business arrangement, marriage etc:

" The monarch had the power to dissolve parliament.

3. EMOTION dissolve into/in laughter/tears etc to start laughing or crying:

" She dissolved into fits of laughter.

4. BECOME WEAKER [intransitive and transitive] to gradually become smaller or weaker before disappearing, or to make something do this:

" Her enthusiasm dissolved his shyness.

" A few clouds formed briefly before dissolving again.
