- The President led the tributes to 'a great statesman and a decent man'.
- The bridge is a remarkable tribute to the skill of the Victorian railway engineers.
- The couple paid tribute to the helicopter crew who rescued them.
- Thousands of people stood in silent tribute to the dead president.
- Tributes flooded in when her death was announced.
