Integrity or honour? **Integrity** means being good and honest so that you can approve of yourself; **honour** means being good and honest so that you keep your reputation. **Integrity** is usually individual; **honour** can be individual or collective:

- to defend the family honour
- ✗ to defend the family integrity

- Her photography had great artistic integrity.
- I would never do anything to compromise the integrity of the company.
- It's up to the user to ensure the integrity of the data they enter.
- Nuclear weapons have the capability to destroy the physical integrity of the planet.
- She has great personal integrity.

- She refused to compromise her artistic integrity.
