- the effects of trauma and stress on the body
- The children showed no signs of trauma after their ordeal.

2. **countable, uncountable** an unpleasant experience that makes you feel upset and/or anxious

- She felt exhausted after the traumas of recent weeks.

3. **uncountable, countable** (*medical*) an injury

- The patient suffered severe brain trauma.

Word Origin:

late 17th cent.: from Greek, literally 'wound'.

Example Bank:

- patients who have histories of childhood trauma
- It can take a long time to get over such a trauma.
