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COLLOCATIONS

■ ADJECTIVES/NOUN + stereotype

- **racial/racist stereotypes** The novel has been criticized for reinforcing racial stereotypes.
- **cultural stereotypes** His jokes often depend on cultural stereotypes.
- **national stereotypes** Such cartoons show how persistent national stereotypes are.
- **sexual/gender stereotypes** Feminists justifiably object to these sexual stereotypes.
- **an old/traditional stereotype** Many people still believe that old stereotype.
- **a popular/common stereotype** Current evidence indicates that older people are more healthy than popular stereotypes suggest.
- **a negative stereotype** We should avoid negative stereotypes regarding the performance of older workers.

■ verbs

- **fit/conform to a stereotype** (=be like the usual idea of something) He doesn't fit the stereotype of a Stanford student.
- **reinforce a stereotype** (=make a stereotype stronger by showing or describing someone in the usual way) Charities for older people must be careful not to reinforce harmful stereotypes.
- **challenge a stereotype** (=be different from the usual idea of something) These young women want to challenge gender stereotypes.
