1. ~ **sth** (formal) to prevent sth from happening or make it happen more slowly or less frequently than normal
  - A lack of oxygen may inhibit brain development in the unborn child.
  - Financial considerations are inhibiting access to higher education.
2. ~ **sb (from sth/from doing sth)** to make sb nervous or embarrassed so that they are unable to do sth
  - The managing director's presence inhibited them from airing their problems.

Word Origin:

late Middle English (in the sense 'forbid (a person) to do something'): from Latin **inhibere** 'hinder', from **in-** 'in' + **habere** 'hold'.
