 - the reconstruction of the sea walls
- countable** a copy of sth that no longer exists
 - The doorway is a 19th century reconstruction of Norman work.

 - Last night police staged a reconstruction of the incident.
- Reconstruction uncountable** (in the US) the period after the Civil War when the southern states returned to the US and laws were passed that gave rights to African Americans

Culture:

During **Reconstruction** US political and military forces controlled and punished the southern states. Laws were passed making [↑]slavery illegal and giving African Americans the right to vote and hold public office. White Southerners were upset by many Reconstruction practices, such as unusual elections that put former slaves in state governments. This was one cause of the growth of the [↑]Ku Klux Klan.
