Word Origin:late Middle English (originally in the sense ‘twittering, chattering’, later ‘gibberish’): from Old French **jargoun**, of unknown origin. The main sense dates from the mid 17th cent.Example Bank:

• He always speaks in obscure legal jargon.

• Her emails are always couched in jargon.

• The report seemed to be written in computer jargon.
