Word Origin:

Middle English (in the sense 'shut in, imprison'): from Old French **enclos**, past participle of **enclorre**, based on Latin **includere** 'shut in'.

Example Bank:

- The non-smoking section was completely enclosed in glass.
- The ring is enclosed in a plastic case.
- I can't stand being shut in a small enclosed space.
- The garden was enclosed by a tall, black wooden fence.
- The land was enclosed in the seventeenth century.
