- 1) домик; сторожка (*у ворот парка, поместья*); будка; квартира привратника
 - охотничий домик
 - временное жильё; приют
ski lodge - приют лыжников; лыжная база
 - амер.** летний коттедж
 - швейцарская (*в гостинице, многоквартирном доме и т. п.*); проходная (*на предприятии*)
 - 1) жильё индейцев; вигвам, хоган *и т. п.*

- 1) разместить; (временно) поселить (*у себя*); предоставить помещение, приютить
this building can lodge 50 families - в этом здании может поместиться пятьдесят семейств
we can lodge you for a day or two - мы можем приютить вас на день, другой
we were well lodged - с жильём мы устроились хорошо
 - поселить кого-л. где-л.; устроить на постой
to lodge children with relatives - (временно) поселить /устроить/ детей у родственников
the refugees were lodged in schools - беженцев разместили по школам
 - (временно) поселиться; (временно) жить (*где-л.*)
to lodge out - а) ночевать не дома; б) ночевать в общежитии, на работе (*о сменных рабочих и т. п.*)
I lodged with a friend of mine - я поселился у друга
 - 1) снимать комнату *или* комнаты (*у кого-л.*)
where are you lodging now? - где /у кого/ вы теперь живёте?
I'm lodging at Mrs. P.'s [with Mr. P.] - я снимаю комнату у г-жи [г-на] П.
 - сдавать комнаты; брать жильцов
 - 1) засесть, застрять
the bullet lodged in his arm - пуля засела у него в руке
a bone lodged in his throat - кость застряла у него в горле
 - всадить (*пулю и т. п.*); нанести (*удар*)
to lodge a bullet in a wall - всадить пулю в стену
to lodge a blow on smb.'s jaw - врезать кому-л. по скуле
 - оставлять
to lodge in the memory - запечатлеть в памяти
the tide lodges mud in the cavities - после прилива во впадинах /в ямах/ остаётся ил и грязь
 - (in, with) помещать, класть (*в банк и т. п.*)
to lodge one's valuables in the bank - сдать свои ценности на хранение в банк
 - 1) прибить (*о ветре, ливне*)
 - полегать (*о хлебе, посевах*)
 - наделять (*правами, полномочиями и т. п.*)
to lodge power with smb. /in the hands of smb./ - облекать кого-л. властью /полномочиями/

1. **transitive ~ sth (with sb) (against sb/sth) (formal)** to make a formal statement about sth to a public organization or authority

Syn: ↑register, **Syn:** ↑submit

- They lodged a compensation claim against the factory.
- Portugal has lodged a complaint with the International Court of Justice.

2. **intransitive + adv./prep. (old-fashioned)** to pay to live in a room in sb's house

Syn: ↑board

- He lodged with Mrs Brown when he arrived in the city.

3. **transitive ~ sb (+ adv./prep.)** to provide sb with a place to sleep or live

Syn: ↑accommodate

- The refugees are being lodged at an old army base.

4. **intransitive, transitive** to become fixed or stuck somewhere; to make sth become fixed or stuck somewhere

- ~ **in sth** One of the bullets lodged in his chest.
- ~ **sth in sth** She lodged the number firmly in her mind.

5. **transitive ~ sth with sb/in sth** to leave money or sth valuable in a safe place

Syn: ↑deposit

- Your will should be lodged with your lawyer.

2. **BECOME STUCK** [*intransitive always + adverb/preposition, transitive usually passive*] to become firmly stuck somewhere, or to make something become stuck **OPP dislodge**

lodge in

- The fishbone lodged in her throat.

be lodged in/between/behind etc something

- The bullet was lodged in his spine.

3. **PUT SOMEBODY SOMEWHERE** [*transitive*] to provide someone with a place to stay for a short time:

- a building used to lodge prisoners of war

lodge somebody in/at something

- The refugees were lodged in old army barracks.

4. **PUT SOMETHING SOMEWHERE** [*transitive*] *British English formal* to put something important in an official place so that it is safe

lodge something with somebody

- Be sure to lodge a copy of the contract with your solicitor.

lodge something in something

- The money was lodged in a Swiss bank account.

5. **STAY SOMEWHERE** [*intransitive always + adverb/preposition*] *old-fashioned* to pay to live in a room in someone's house

lodge at/with etc

John lodged with a family in Bristol when he first started work.

[Date: 1200-1300; Language: Old French; Origin: loge 'small building']

1. a small house on the land of a large country house, usually at the main entrance gate
2. a room or small building at the entrance to a college, institution etc for someone whose job is to watch who enters and leaves:
the porter's lodge
3. a house or hotel in the country or mountains where people can stay when they want to go hunting, shooting etc
4. a local meeting place for some organizations, or the group of people who belong to one of these organizations:
He was a member of a Masonic lodge.
5. a **↑beavers** home
6. *American English* a traditional home of Native Americans, or the group of people that live in it
