You feel ashamed when you feel guilty because of something wrong that you have deliberately done: ▫ You should be ashamed of treating your daughter like that. Do not use ashamed when you are talking about something that is not very serious or important: ▫ I am sorry that I forgot to buy the milk. ◇ I am ashamed that I forgot to buy the milk.

You feel embarrassed when you have made a mistake or done something stupid or feel awkward in front of other people: ▫ I was embarrassed about forgetting his name.

THESAURUS

- **ashamed** [not before noun] feeling very sorry and embarrassed because of something you have done, or someone connected with you has done: You should be ashamed of yourself. | She felt deeply ashamed of her son's behaviour.
- **humiliated** [not before noun] very ashamed and upset, because someone has made you look weak or stupid, especially in front of other people: I came out of the class feeling humiliated.
- **mortified** /'mɔːtəfaɪd/ extremely ashamed and embarrassed, especially about something you have done accidentally: She'll be mortified when she realizes her mistake. | a mortified expression
- **shamefaced** showing by the expression on your face that you are ashamed about something: Paul came into my office looking shamefaced and apologized for what he had done.
- **feel guilty** (also **feel bad especially spoken**) to feel worried and unhappy because you know that you have done something wrong. **Feel bad** is more informal than **feel guilty**: He felt guilty about lying to his parents. | I felt bad about letting the team down.
- **lose face** to lose people's respect for you, especially by doing something that makes you look weak or stupid in front of other people: He feels he'll lose face if he admits to his staff that he was wrong.
