• Two hundred (pounds) was withdrawn from the account.

• hundreds of miles away

• for hundreds of years

• If I've said it once, I've said it a hundred times.

• I have **a hundred and one** things to do.

• (formal) Men died in their hundreds.

3. the hundreds plural the numbers from 100 to 999

• We're talking about a figure in the low hundreds.

4. **the... hundreds plural** the years of a particular century
- the early nineteenth hundreds (= written 'early 1900s')
5. **one, two, three, etc. ~ hours** used to express whole hours in the 24-hour system
- twelve hundred hours (= 12.00, midday)

more at ninety-nine times out of hundred **at** ↑**ninety**

Idioms: ↑**give a hundred per cent** = hundred per cent

Word Origin:

late Old English, from hund 'hundred' (from an Indo-European root shared with Latin **centum** and Greek **hekatón**) + a second element meaning 'number'; of Germanic origin and related to Dutch **honderd** and German **hundert**.
