1. **юр.** ордер; судебное распоряжение; ордер на арест (*тж.* warrant of arrest)

warrant of distress - приказ о наложении ареста *или* об изъятии (*имущества*); исполнительный лист

warrant of caption - приказ о поимке (беглого) преступника

warrant of death, warrant of execution - распоряжение о приведении в исполнение приговора к смертной казни

general warrant - ордер на задержание (*лиц, подозреваемых в преступлении без указания фамилии*)

a warrant is out against him - подписан приказ о его аресте

2. **преим. юр.** полномочие, правомочие

warrant of attorney - (специальная) доверенность

3. основание для чего-л., оправдание (*каких-л. действий*); моральное право

he has no warrant for saying so - у него нет оснований /он не вправе/ так говорить

good intentions are no warrant for irregular actions - добрые намерения не оправдывают неправильных действий

there is no warrant for such a belief - это убеждение совершенно необоснованно /беспочвенно/

4. свидетельство, доказательство, подтверждение

his presence here is a warrant of his sincerity - его присутствие здесь - доказательство его искренности

5. гарантия, залог

6. **фин.** удостоверение, свидетельство; купон (*облигации, акции*)

dividend warrant - свидетельство *или* купон на получение дивиденда; процентный купон

share warrant (to bearer) - акция на предъявителя

7. **ком.** складочное свидетельство; (складской) варрант (*тж.* warehouse warrant)

dock warrant - доковый варрант

8. патент

1) разрешение; приказ

1. оправдывать, служить основанием

the need warrants the expenditure - этот расход оправдан необходимостью

my remarks did not warrant her tears - в моих замечаниях не было ничего обидного, но она заплакала

we are not warranted in believing ... - у нас нет оснований полагать ...

2. ручаться, гарантировать; подтверждать (*что-л.*)

I'll warrant him an honest fellow - ручаюсь, что он честный человек, я поручусь за его честность

this material is warranted (to be) colour-fast - прочность окраски ткани гарантируется

the genuineness is warranted by several facts - подлинность (*чего-л.*) подтверждается несколькими фактами

3. **преим. юр.** разрешать, давать право; уполномочивать

the law warrants this procedure - закон допускает /предусматривает/ такую процедуру

4. **разг.** выражать уверенность; ручаться

I'll warrant (you) that ... - уверен в том, что ...; будьте уверены, что ..., заверяю вас, что ...

I'll warrant he'll be late - ручаюсь, что он опоздает

I warrant this is the truth - уверен, что так и было

5. **юр.** гарантировать; обеспечивать (*кому-л. что-л.*)

**noun**

1. **countable** a legal document that is signed by a judge and gives the police authority to do sth

• an arrest warrant

• ~ **for sth** They **issued a warrant** for her arrest.

• ~ **to do sth** They had a warrant to search the house.

**see also** ↑death warrant, ↑search warrant

2. **countable** ~ (**for sth**) a document that gives you the right to receive money, services, etc

• the issue of warrants for equity shares

3. **uncountable** ~ (**for sth/for doing sth**) (*formal*) (usually in negative sentences) an acceptable reason for doing sth

• There is no warrant for such criticism.

**Word Origin:**

Middle English (in the senses 'protector' and 'safeguard', also, as a verb, 'keep safe from danger'): from variants of Old French **guarant** (noun), **guarantir** (verb), of Germanic origin; compare with ↑guarantee.

**Example Bank:**

• In certain circumstances, police may enter premises without a warrant.

• Police who executed a search warrant found a substantial amount of stolen property on the premises.

• The commissioner has issued a warrant for her arrest.

• The judge issued a bench warrant.

• The king refused to sign the death warrant for his old friend.

• The police served a warrant on him.

- Federal agents tried to serve arrest warrants on him for firearms offences.
- Police arrived with a search warrant.
- The police arrived with a warrant to search the house.

Idiom: ↑ **warrant**

verb (formal)

to make sth necessary or appropriate in a particular situation

Syn: ↑ **justify**

- ~ **sth** Further investigation is clearly warranted.
- ~ **(sb/sth) doing sth** The situation scarcely warrants their/them being dismissed.

see also ↑ **unwarranted**

**warrant for**

" The magistrate **issued** a **warrant** for his arrest. ⇒ ↑ **death warrant**, ↑ **search warrant**

2. **[countable]** an official document giving someone the right to do something, for example buy ↑ **shares** in a company:

" The company **issued** **warrants** for 300,000 shares.

3. **formal** **no warrant for (doing) something** no good reason for doing something:

" There is no **warrant** for copying other people's work.

⇒ ↑ **unwarranted**

**warrant attention/consideration etc**

" Another area that **warrants** attention is that of funding for universities.

2. to promise that something is true

**warrant that**

" The Author hereby **warrants** that the Publisher is the owner of the copyright.

3. **I'll warrant (you) old-fashioned** used to tell someone that you are sure about something

**warrant (that)**

" I'll **warrant** we won't see him again.
