Word Origin:[**vegetation**] mid 16th cent. (originally referring to the action or process of vegetating): from medieval Latin **vegetatio(n)** ‘**power of growth**’, from the verb **vegetare**, from **vegetus** ‘**active**’, from **vegere** ‘**be active**’.Example Bank:

- As we drove towards the desert, the vegetation became sparse.
- Removal of the natural vegetation has resulted in a loss of nutrients in the soil.
