Word Origin:Middle English: from Old Northern French *werreior*, variant of Old French *guerreior*, from *guerreier* 'make war', from *guerre* 'war'.Example Bank:

- He saved his fellow warrior.
- He views himself as a holy warrior.
- Paul was a weekend warrior in the first part of his career.
- the armchair warriors at the Department of Defense
- the graves of the fallen warriors
- the last of the ancient warriors
- A Viking warrior would be buried with his weapons: usually his sword, spear, shield and battleaxe.
