- She filled the jars with the tomato sauce.
- a jar full of pickled onions
- She bought a set of storage jars for the kitchen.
- These enormous stone jars are thought to be more than 2 000 years old.
- a jar of jam/coffee/honey
- an empty jam jar

verb (-rr-)

1. **transitive, intransitive** to give or receive a sudden sharp painful knock
 - ~ **sth** The jolt seemed to jar every bone in her body.
 - ~ **(sth) (on sth)** The spade jarred on something metal.
2. **intransitive, transitive ~ (on sth) | ~ (sth)** to have an unpleasant or annoying effect

Syn: †grate

- His constant moaning was beginning to jar on her nerves.
- There was a jarring note of triumph in his voice.

3. **intransitive ~ (with sth)** to be different from sth in a strange or unpleasant way

Syn: †clash

- Her brown shoes jarred with the rest of the outfit.
- The only jarring note was the cheap modern furniture.
