1. **countable, uncountable** a curved path followed by a planet or an object as it moves around another planet, star, moon, etc

• the earth's orbit around the sun

• a space station **in orbit** round the moon

2. **singular** an area that a particular person, organization, etc. deals with or is able to influence

• to **come/fall/be within sb's orbit**

Word Origin:

mid 16th cent. (referring to the eye socket): from Latin *orbita* 'course, track' (in medieval Latin 'eye socket'), feminine of *orbitus* 'circular', from *orbis* 'ring'.
