in anticipation of an early reply - в ожидании /ожидаю/ скорого ответа
thanking you in anticipation - заранее благодарный (концовка письма)
- юр.* преждевременность совершения действия или требования о выполнении (чего-л.)
anticipation of payment - досрочный платёж
- 1) преждевременное наступление
2) *мед.* наступление раньше срока (менструации и т. п.)

 - The courtroom was filled with anticipation.

Word Origin:

[**anticipation**] late Middle English: from Latin **anticipatio(n)-**, from the verb **anticipare**, based on **ante-** 'before' + **capere** 'take'.

Example Bank:

- People are buying extra groceries in anticipation of heavy snowstorms.
- The unexpected news sent a thrill of anticipation through the group.
- There is growing anticipation that the chairman will have to resign.
- There was a sense of anticipation in the audience as the curtain went up for the premiere.
- These brief glimpses heightened their anticipation of when they could be together.
- We are full of anticipation, and can't wait to visit you.
- We look forward to your lecture with eager anticipation.
- a feeling of pleasurable anticipation
- Parents visit the school in anticipation that action will be taken.
- There was widespread anticipation of further expansion.
