1. возвращение (к чему-л.); повторение (чего-л.)  
the recurrence of the same follies - повторение тех же нелепых поступков  
to prevent the recurrence of smth. - предотвратить повторение / возрождение / чего-л.
2. возврат, рецидив; повторяемость  
recurrence of an epidemic - новая вспышка эпидемии  
recurrence of hereditary traits - проявление наследственных признаков
3. обращение (за помощью и т. п.)  
to have recurrence to smth. - прибегать к чему-л.  
to have recurrence to arms - взяться за оружие, прибегнуть к вооружённой силе
4. спец. рекуррентность
