without stint - без ограничения

to work without stint - работать не жалея сил

to spend money without stint - тратить деньги не считая

stint reading - обязательное чтение

to appoint /to set/ a stint - назначить норму /долю/

to stint oneself (for one's children) - отказывать себе /урезывать себя/ (ради детей)

to stint smb. of /in/ smth. - урезывать /ограничивать/ кого-л. в чём-л.

to stint oneself in food - ограничивать себя в еде

not to stint smth. - не скупиться на что-л.

don't stint the food - не жалеете еды, не скупитесь на еду

the family were stinted of all the things that make life easy and pleasant - эта семья была лишена всего, что делает жизнь лёгкой и приятной

- He **did a stint** abroad early in his career.
- a two-year stint in the Navy
- I've done my stint in the kitchen for today.

Word Origin:Old English **styntan** 'make blunt', of Germanic origin; related to the verb **↑stunt**.Example Bank:

- He later served a stint in the Navy.
- He's doing a brief stint at the World Bank in Washington.
- His résumé includes a stint as a professor of physics.
- She met her husband during her stint at the London office.
- The singer enjoyed a short stint at number one.
- He hated his two-year stint in the Navy.
- I've done my stint in the kitchen for today.
- She did a stint abroad early in her career.

**verb intransitive, transitive** (usually used in negative sentences)

to provide or use only a small amount of sth

- ~ **(on sth)** She never stints on the food at her parties.
- ~ **yourself** We don't need to stint ourselves— have some more!
