- 1) отклоняться, уклоняться (о принятого направления, курса и т. п.)
to deviate from a path - а) пойти не по дороге; б) отклониться от принятого пути
to deviate to the south - отклониться к югу
- 2) отходить, уклоняться
to deviate from a topic - отклониться от темы
to deviate from the truth - отойти от истины
to deviate from one's duty - уклоняться от выполнения долга
- 3) отклонять; вызывать отклонение; менять направление
a deep iron keel with tend to deviate the compass - массивный стальной киль вызовет отклонение компаса

Word Origin:

mid 16th cent. (as an adjective in the sense 'remote'): from late Latin **deviat-** 'turned out of the way', from the verb **deviare**, from **de-** 'away from' + **via** 'way'. The verb dates from the mid 17th cent.
