Word Origin:

Middle English (formerly also as *inlarge*): from Old French *enlarger*, from *en-* (expressing a change of state) + *large* 'large'.

Example Bank:

- The castle was enlarged considerably in the fifteenth century.
- The gallery is seeking to enlarge its holdings of Danish art.
- The images were enlarged to the size of a wall of a room.
- Symptoms may include a sore throat and enlarged glands.
- The little blisters enlarge and eventually burst to form ulcers.
- We're going to have this picture enlarged.
