3. **intransitive + adv./prep.** (*of a person or an animal*) to run or walk fast, taking short quick steps

• The children trotted into the room.

4. **intransitive + adv./prep.** (*informal*) to walk or go somewhere

• The guide led the way and we trotted along behind him.

Middle English: from Old French **trot** (noun), **troter** (verb), from medieval Latin **trottare**, of Germanic origin.

Example Bank:

- Anne trotted obediently beside her mother.
- He trotted off to greet the other guests.
- She trotted quickly down the stairs.
- Bob trotted his pony around the field.
- He had to trot briskly to keep up with his wife.
- He hurried off, his assistants trotting after him.
- I could hear the sound of several horses trotting along in the lane.
- She marched up the path, her son trotting beside her.
- She waved an arm and off she trotted.
- The dog trotted obediently at her heels.
- The mare whinnied softly and trotted up to him.

 - The horse slowed to a trot.
 - The girl **broke into a trot** and disappeared around the corner.

Middle English: from Old French **trot** (noun), **troter** (verb), from medieval Latin **trottare**, of Germanic origin.

Example Bank:

- We set off at a fast trot.
- When the horses reached the field they broke into a brisk trot.
- She moved at a brisk trot.

1. **[intransitive]** if a horse trots, it moves fairly quickly with each front leg moving at the same time as the opposite back leg ⇒ **canter**, **gallop**
2. **[intransitive always + adverb/preposition]** if a person or animal trots, they run fairly slowly, taking short regular steps:

She came trotting down the steps from the library.
3. **[intransitive always + adverb/preposition] informal** to walk or go somewhere, especially fairly quickly:

He trotted off and came back a couple of minutes later, holding a parcel.

trot something ↔ **out phrasal verb informal**

to give opinions, excuses, reasons etc that you have used too many times and that do not seem sincere:
Steve trotted out the same old excuses.

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THESAURUS

■ **animals running**

- **trot** to run fairly slowly, taking short steps – used especially about horses and dogs: A little dog was trotting behind her.
- **gallop** if a horse gallops, it runs very quickly: The horse galloped off across the field.
- **bolt** to suddenly run somewhere very fast, especially in order to escape: Suddenly a fox bolted out from beneath a hedge.

3. **SLOW RUN [singular]** a fairly slow way of running in which you take short regular steps:

She broke into a trot (=started running slowly) and hurried on ahead of us.
