- засорение

- = clog-dance
- бревно, полено; большой кусок дерева

- препятствовать; мешать; ≅ связывать по рукам и ногам
restraints that have been clogging the market - ограничения, затрудняющие функционирование рынка
to clog smb.'s movement - затруднять чьи-л. движения
- 1) засорять, загрязнять; набивать, забивать
the road was clogged with cars - дорога была запружена машинами
his brain is clogged with useless facts - его голова забита ненужными фактами
2) засоряться, загрязняться; забиваться (*о трубе и т. п.*)
this road always clogs during the rush hour - в часы пик на этой дороге всегда заторы
3) загрязняться; засаливаться (*о шлифовальном круге*)
- 1) подбивать (*башмаки*) деревянной подошвой
2) танцевать в деревянных башмаках
